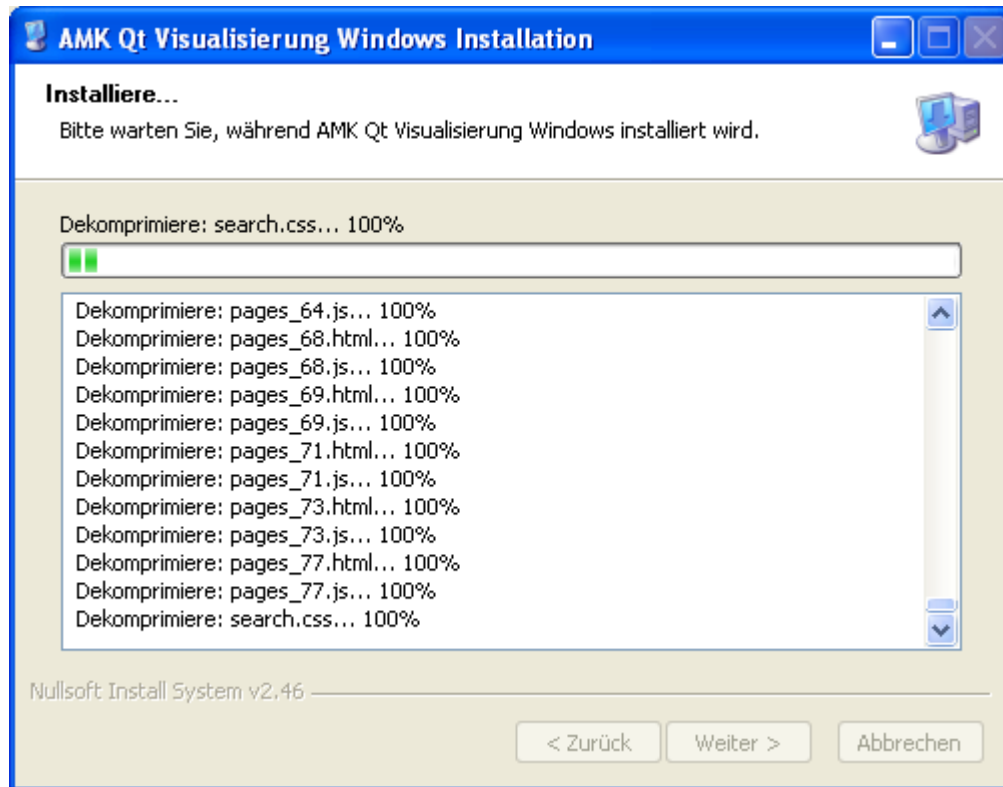

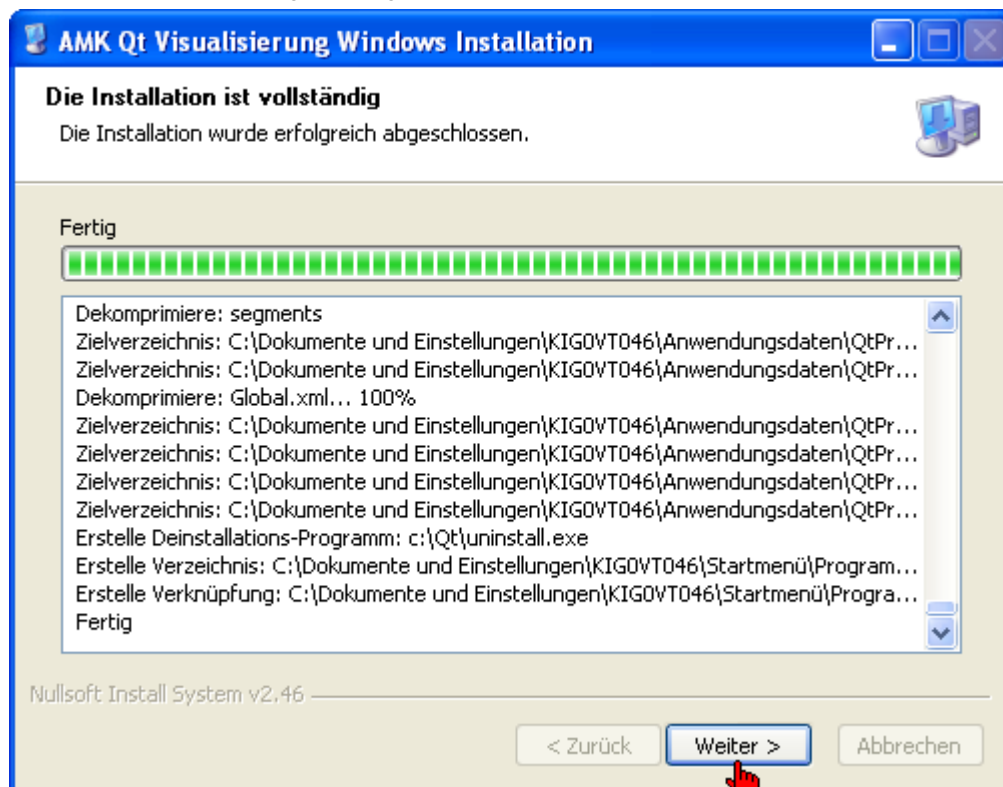

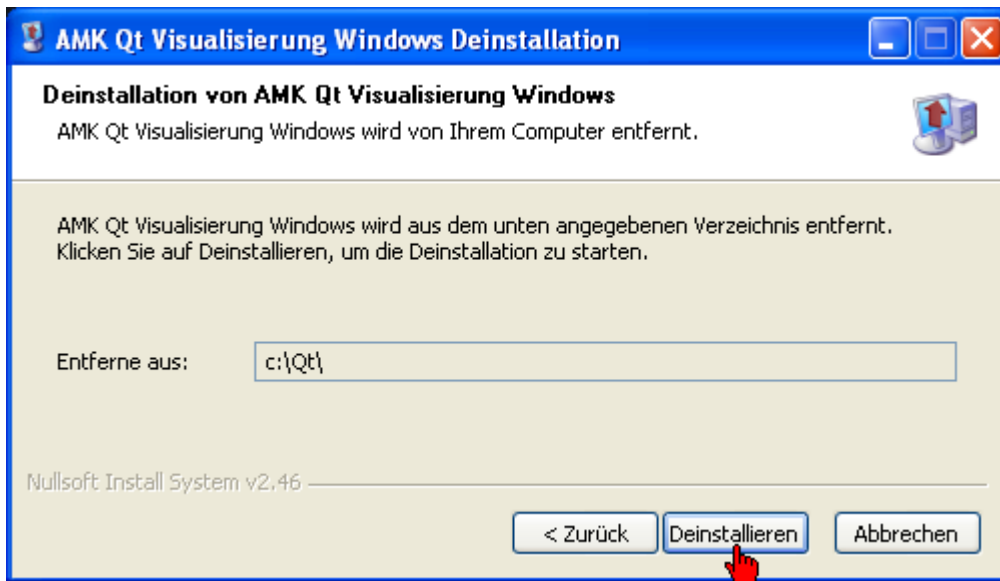

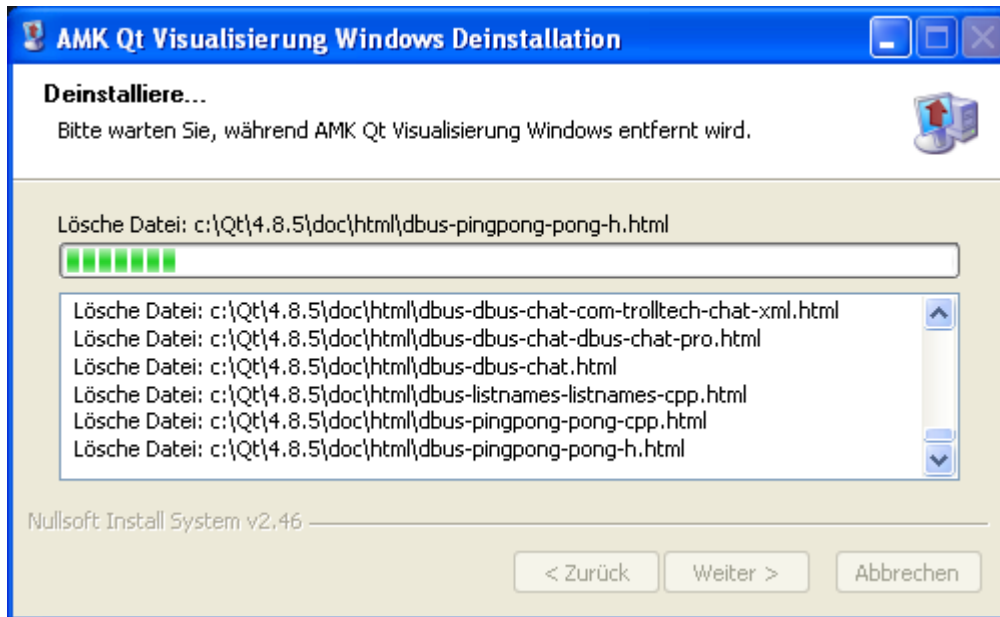

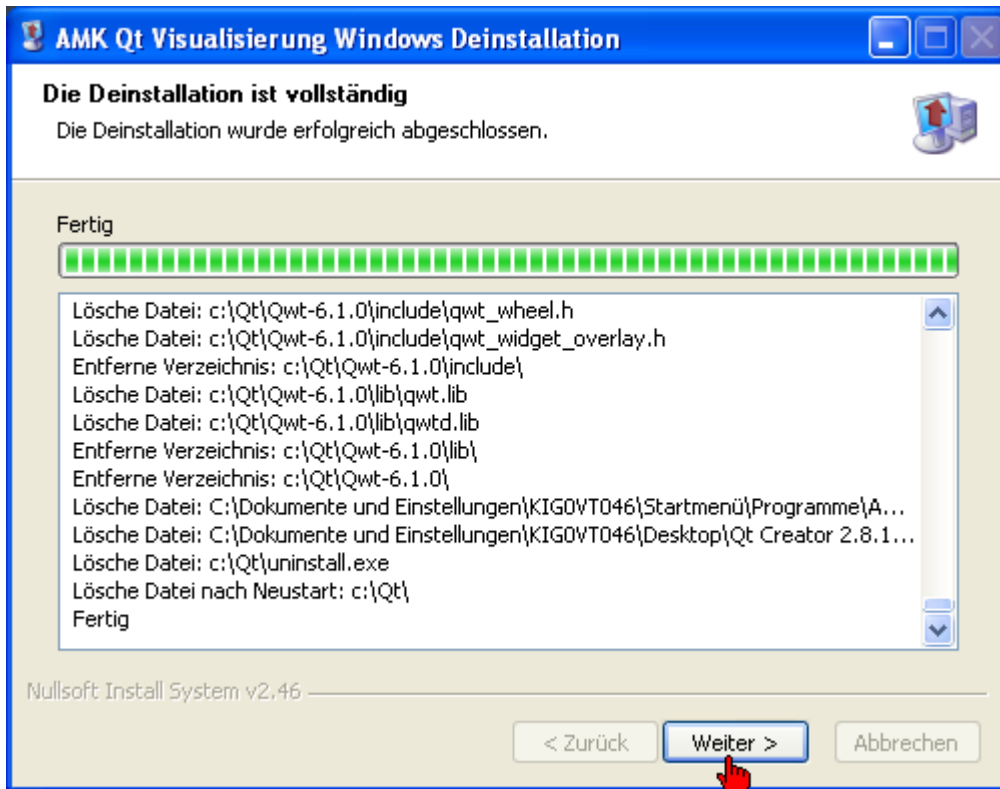
Deinstallationspfad

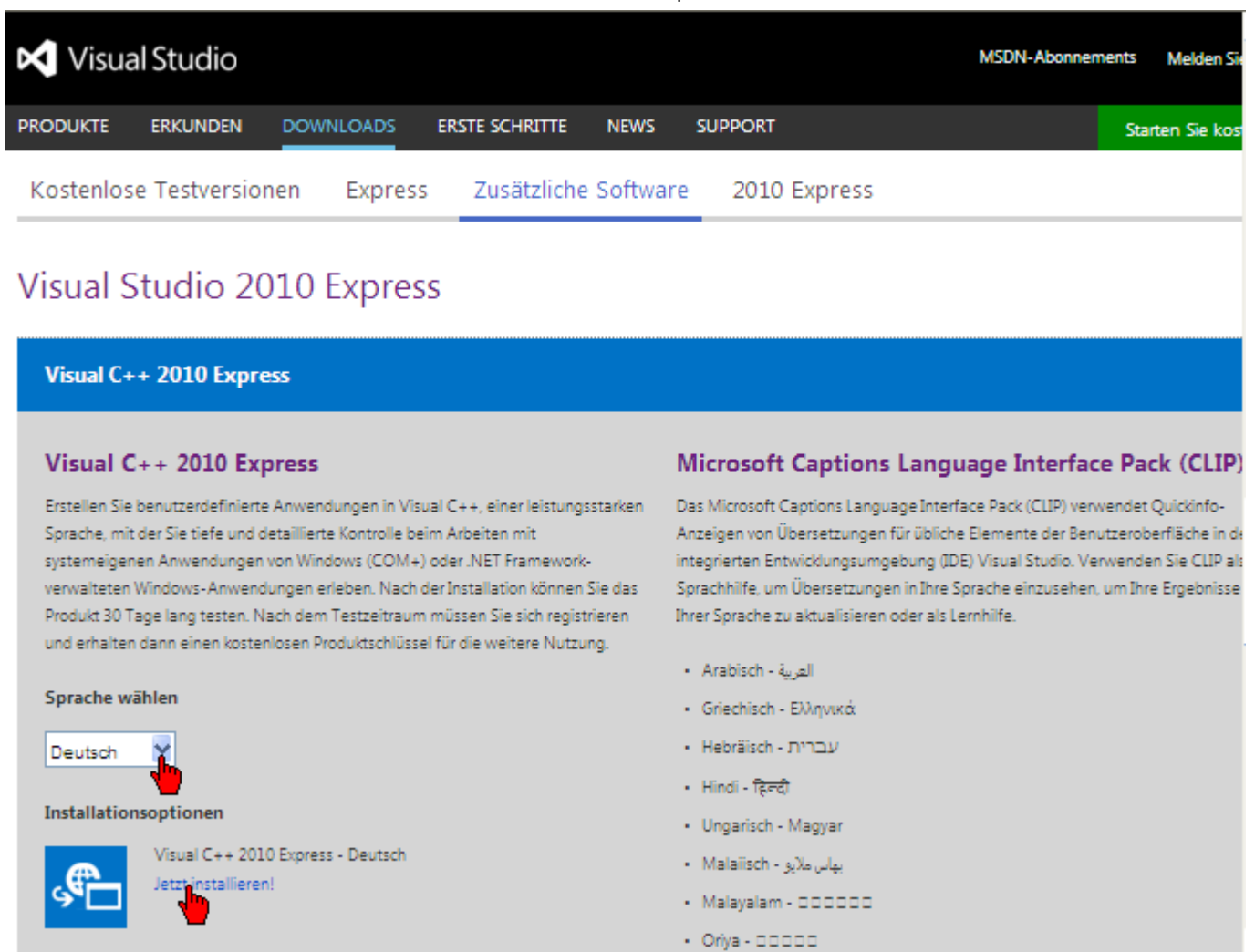

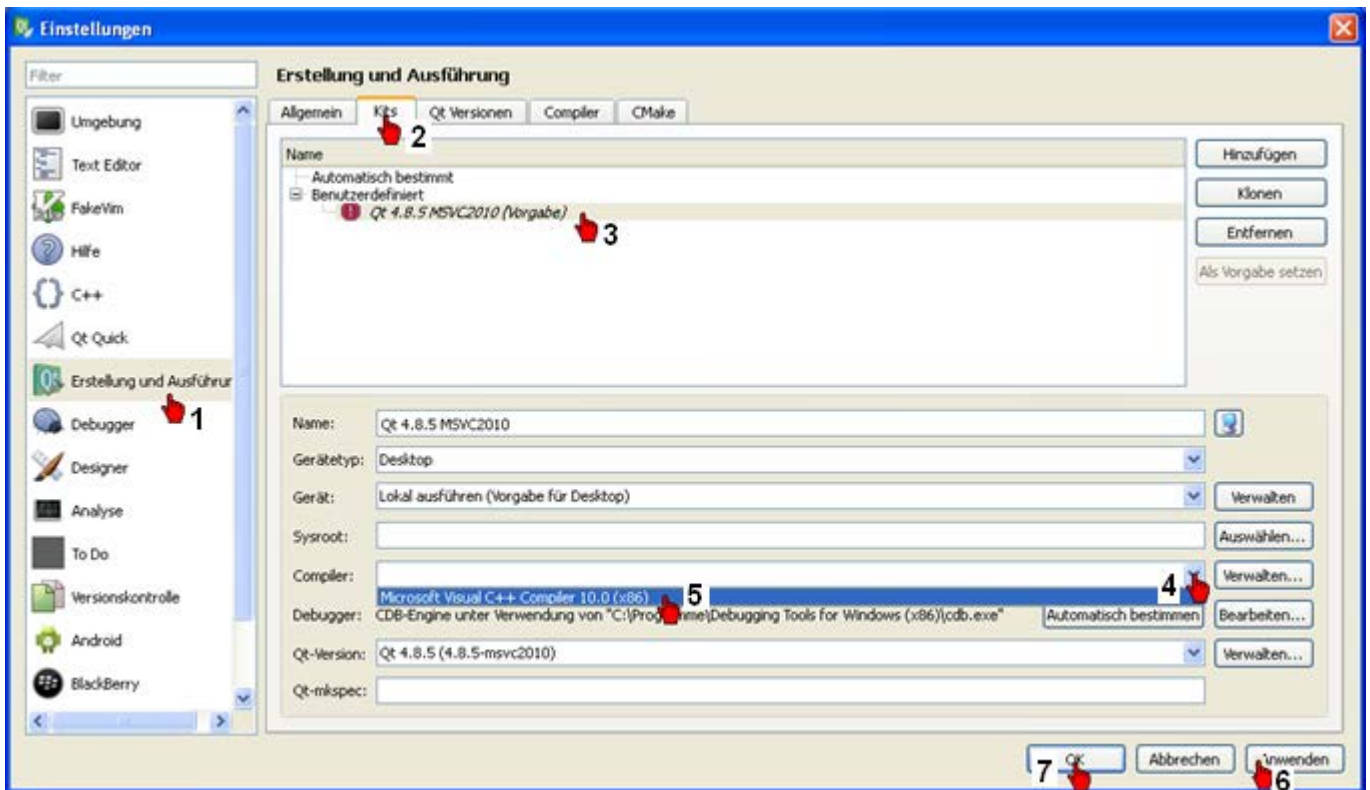

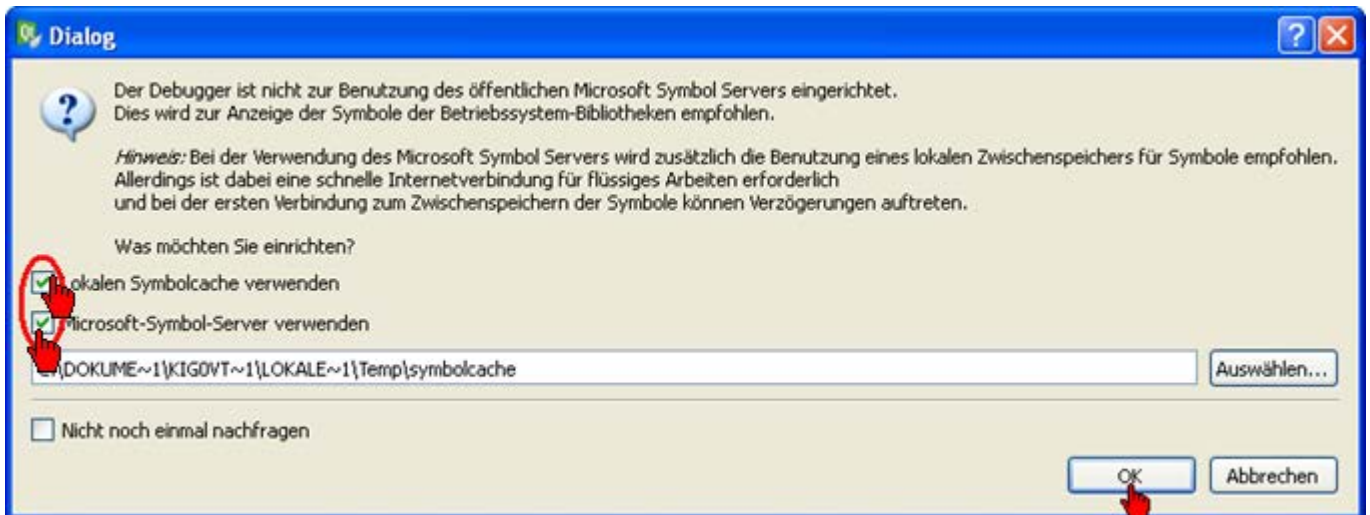

#### Version 2, June 1991

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The precise terms and conditions for copying, distribution and modification follow.
